

The history of coffee growing in southern Minas Gerais is built on dedication, tradition, and innovation across generations. This month, we highlight Glauber Prado, a cooperative member whose journey is connected with the history of COOMAP, the Dom Bosco Sports Complex, and the Paraguaçu community itself.



# Grower of the month



Born in 1940, Glauber Prado grew up watching his father work in farming but also faced the challenges of economic instability. His father went bankrupt as a coffee producer during one of the crises that affected the coffee industry in the first half of the 20th century, which led him to seek new opportunities, first in the notary office and later in coffee trading. This experience left a lasting impact on Glauber, teaching him resilience and hard work from an early age.

In 1956, he enrolled at the Salesian Gymnasium Dom Bosco, where he not only solidified his academic foundation but also strengthened his ties with sports and the community. At the age of 20 years old, he began his career at the local notary office in 1960, where

he has now worked for impressive 65 years. Later, he majored in Law in 1977.

Despite his intense professional life, coffee farming was always present. In 1976, after his father passed away, Glauber took over the management of the family farm, which at the time had 21 hectares. Through dedication and strategic vision, he expanded the property to its current 52 hectares, maintaining coffee as the core of production. Today, his son Walker and grandson Claiton continue the family legacy, ensuring that tradition remains strong for future generations.

Beyond his work in the field and at the notary office, Glauber has always been a sports enthusiast. An avid football, shuttlecock, and volleyball player,



he instilled a love for sports in his children, especially Walker, who competed internationally in swimming. His connection to sports didn't stop there: as one of the founders of the Dom Bosco Alumni Union, he played a key role in making the Dom Bosco Sports Complex a reality— both during its construction back in the 90's and now after COOMAP started managing it.



Today, at 84 years old, Glauber Prado looks back on his journey with pride. He feels fulfilled, having honored his father's legacy and, most importantly, seeing his children and grandchildren continue to care for the coffee farm he worked so hard to preserve. His name, along with his work, remains a vital part of COOMAP's living history and the Paraguaçu community.
